Knowledge exchange

- Knowledge building events like thematic conference and using novel formats like webinar, roadshow, etc.
- Sharing of agricultural biodiversity initiatives by members through newsletter, uploading of videos in the website, etc.



Skills exchange



- Mapping of skills on agricultural biodiversity of the members need to be undertaken to facilitate exchange of skills based on demand.
- Facilitation of training at regional/ country levels
- Facilitation of exchange visit for considerable duration among partners
